Their 2018 report celebrated the work of Helen Gans, Ann Lambie and Janette Hennigar. All proceeds were donated to St. Andrew's and their area was brightened by new carpets and lights. A similar joy was shared for the Annual Report of 2019 with new helpers, Trudy and Patti, joining the team and being blessed in helping a brand-new family to Canada with much-needed items to facilitate a move into an apartment for startup housekeeping.

The untold story of this valuable ministry was the joy of seeing the faces of these women as they arrived for their shifts in the Thrift Shop. They have loved what they do, the people they serve and feeling they were making a contribution to individuals and families who shopped their aisles and for what they have been able to give back to St. Andrew's.

2020 has impacted us all. It has robbed us of our energy and the familiarity of our ministry at 680 Courtney Street. The pandemic interrupted the flow of gifts to the Thrift Shop and the regular shopping habits of those who looked for bargains in the St. Andrew's basement. The Thrift Shop has made the difficult but necessary decision to cease operations knowing that it may be sometime before we might even consider returning to normal schedules.

The Thrift Shop ladies are to be commended and celebrated for the passion and hard work they have brought to this distinctive ministry of St. Andrew's. They have interacted with, ministered to and helped many that most of us never see within our building. They have been faithful to their mission and diligent in their work. Thank you to all who volunteered over the years in this distinctive St. Andrew's mission. Thank you especially to Janette Hennigar for your wit and wisdom and for your dedication and service.

The Thrift Shop items are being re-purposed to other need-based endeavours in Victoria and the basement space will soon be re-developed for other St. Andrew's mission projects.

Message from Session

The session welcomed Jack Reimer (Treasurer) to the December meeting to present a draft budget. Jack provided a helpful overview of the finances of the church in this most unusual year. You will be receiving a copy of the draft budget for 2021. Presbyterian polity says that the annual budget must be approved by the congregation. We have had to be creative in working out how this will happen. In brief, it is proposed that we hold a congregational meeting following the worship service on 13 December, with opportunity for those not attending to join the meeting via Zoom or phone, so that everyone has the opportunity to ask questions and indicate if they are in support of the budget as presented. Due to the current restrictions on faith-based gatherings, this plan may have to change and details will be shared via the weekly TWASA, and by phone for those who have no email.

It is anticipated that live-streaming our worship service will continue, beyond the restrictions imposed by COVID. There are many people who follow our worship services on the web who cannot or choose not to attend in person. Session has approved an expenditure of approximately \$11,000 for the purchase of the necessary technical equipment (including cameras and an additional computer), installation and the training of St Andrew's personnel. This will allow for a wider range of visual presentations for the livestreaming of worship services (different views, zooming in on a person or object etc.). This new technology will also create a more dependable and consistent sound than we are able to achieve with the limited technology currently in place. The Presbytery of Vancouver Island is making matching funds available, up to \$5000 towards the cost of technology associated with the challenges of COVID. The balance of the funds required will be taken out of the property budget for 2020, where there are unused funds that were not utilized due to the unforeseen challenges of the pandemic. If these two funds were not available, a congregational meeting would have been required before processing this expenditure.

Martin Perez is our 'person behind the scenes', doing a great job keeping our website functioning, loading the weekly worship materials and creating new content to keep the website interesting. We are pleased to extend his current contract until the end of June 2021, and

thank him for his hard work and creativity behind the scenes week by week.



Volunteers Needed to Help Clear the Thrift Shop


As our pastor pointed out in his monthly message, the Thrift Shop is now closing. To his thanks, we add that of the Mission and Outreach Committee to the volunteers and donors who have sustained the Thrift Shop for over three decades.

What stage are we at in the closure? In keeping with the spirit of the Thrift Shop, we delivered a load of outdoor clothing to Our Place, and the Compassionate Warehouse, and ReStore came and took items that they can use in their charitable work – for which they were very appreciative. Under current pandemic conditions, other charities cannot help with emptying the Thrift Shop, and much remains to be packed and distributed (notably to Big Brothers and Big Sisters, as they are the closest receiving volunteer agency).

If you would like to help remove old price tags, pack items, or distribute parcels and boxes, then please contact any member of M&O or Patricia Shuckburgh (250-381-1615) who is coordinating volunteers to help ensure safe access. Current "peak COVID" restrictions are stringent, but a return to previous BC Centre for Disease Control restrictions would allow a group of up to four to maintain 2-meter social distancing (with masks) if a group of friends want to work together. If you are interested in helping, please contact us now so that we have an idea of numbers and can plan accordingly, and then, based on evolving CDC guidance, we can set times with you that will help ensure your safety and health.

Share the Joy of Christmas 2020 Update

Just about all the shopping is done and now the wrapping begins!

As I reported in last month's *Link*, the people who attend St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Victoria are continuing the annual tradition of sharing "the joy of Christmas" with the residents of Our Place. Our Place is a low barrier drop-in centre and residence for adults currently experiencing or who have experienced homelessness and housing insecurity. St. Andrew's provides gift bags for the 15 women and 30 men who live in rooms on the top three floors of the building on Pandora Street. These folks are pulling their lives back together and are committed to working forward toward independent living. Our gift bags are often the only items that the residents receive on Christmas morning. When I was looking for toques and gloves for the gift bags two weeks ago, I found that there was a scarcity of warm fleece-lined ones at a reasonable price. Walmart was too expensive and had too few. The dollar store toques were not lined. Most stores that had the lined items were selling them at \$20 per toque and \$10-15 per pair of gloves. I was very happy to find a 'buy-one, getone free' at a store in Mayfair, Mountain Warehouse. At the check-out, the clerk, Marco, asked why I was buying so many items so I told him about our gift bags for Our Place. He conferred with another clerk, Vaillant, and his manager, Brian, and then came back to tell me that the three of them had decided to use their 50% staff discount to make the cost of the toques and gloves less expensive. That was a \$500 discount!

Needless to say, I was very pleased with their generosity and have written a thank-you letter to the three of them, in care of their workplace. I also informed my contact at Our Place about them and she said that she would also get in touch with them to say thanks.

In our gift bags, we also include personal care items like shampoo, soap, razors, shaving foam, toothpaste, a toothbrush, a pocket calendar, antiperspirant, a puzzle book, pens, pencils, and Christmas treats.

Other things that the Share the Joy campaign provides are 20 turkeys (over 10 kilograms each) for the

Christmas dinner that Our Place provides each year a few days before December 25th. This meal feeds the working poor, the homeless and those far from home, creating a time of community and warmth at this special time of year.

Usually, our Sunday School children do the wrapping of the gifts that fill our bags for the residents. Because of Covid-19 pandemic restrictions, that is not possible this year. Fortunately, Patricia Shuckburgh has volunteered to wrap all 90 presents (one with stockings and the other with the toques and gloves for each person)! She is cutting, folding and taping paper and attaching a Christmas card to each present. Thank you, Patricia!

You, too, can contribute to St. Andrew's Share the Joy of Christmas 2020. Please consider one of the ways listed below:

Go to St. Andrew's Victoria website: **standrewsvictoria.ca**, and click the **Donate** tab at the top of the page. There are instructions there to help you donate by e-transfer or by using the **Canada Helps** app to make a donation by credit card. Indicate that your donation is for **Share the Joy**.

You can also donate via your church envelopes. Write "Share the Joy" on the line where you enter the amount of your donation. As you come into the narthex of the church off Douglas Street, there are white steel boxes marked **Offerings** where you can deposit your envelope. (The ushers are not collecting the offering during the Sunday service because of COVID-19 restrictions.) This option is curtailed at the moment because of COVID restrictions.

Updates from Vancouver Island Presbytery Meeting - November 2020

Presbytery met November 17, by Zoom. Along with the many business items which were dealt with, there were several highlights for me to pass on to St. Andrew's folks.

We were surprised to learn that Rev. Reid Chudley has resigned from active ministry, effective December 31, 2020. His resignation was accepted with regret. Reid has been the minister at Trinity for the past eight years and they, and we, are sorry to see him go. Reid has also been an active participant in both Presbytery and Synod. Rev. Cathy Victor has been appointed, effective January 1, 2021, as Interim Moderator to Trinity.

As Reid is presently the Moderator of presbytery, Roy Napier was appointed Interim Moderator, effective January 1, 2021.

Presbytery has a new treasurer, Rev. Stephen Bell (new minister at Sooke) who has agreed to take on this role. The past treasurer, Harvey Walker was once again thanked for his many years of service.

Two elders from St. Andrew's Duncan, have taken the extra training required and will be permitted to serve communion at St. Andrew's during this time they are without an ordained minister.

Knowing that finances in all of our congregations will likely be challenging in 2021, Presbytery has agreed that all congregations will each be assessed \$1000.00 for the 2021 budget.

Funding has been approved for 2021 Island camp initiatives. 2020 resulted in the cancellations of camping initiatives but it is Presbytery's hope that 2021 will see those camp projects move forward. Much planning has gone into this and we appreciate the efforts of those involved. If you have questions regarding camp initiatives please ask our rep from St. Andrew's, Jerry Verwey, and he can help with more information.

Each of the congregations on the Island is maintaining communications and connections within their congregations in a variety of ways. Most are doing a combination of 'live streaming' and recording. A few have not attempted to have in person worship but are

making plans for future services. Now that the health guidelines for BC and the Island have changed in recent days we will all need to reevaluate what that means for each of us in the weeks ahead.

It was good to hear that even in this time of uncertainty eleven people became church members recently in Campbell River.

The Fall and Christmas seasons are usually busy times for all of our congregations and many are attempting to adapt their usual events to the new rules.

Comox is doing a virtual nativity display from around the world. Nanaimo is having a virtual Bazaar and a drive by nativity mural. We at St Andrew's are selling jams and preserves online. Others continue to look for new ways to adapt community outreach initiatives.

The audience sat back, relaxed, listened, and were taken away with the beautiful music as it swirled around our Sanctuary.




It was such a joy to attend this performance, and for 45 minutes, we forgot about the pandemic that was going on in the world.


*If possible, Session would like to open the sanctuary on Christmas Eve (Dec. 24) for people to listen to pre-recorded carols at 7 and 9 pm.


