## St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church



The Apostle Paul, while he sat in a prison cell, wrote a letter to a church that he dearly loved and that he desperately wanted to encourage with these words, "Being confident of this very thing, that (God) which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ." Philippians 1:6.

God's good work in us has never wavered since the formation of St. Andrew's in 1866. Throughout these 156 years, the faithful who preceded us met challenge after challenge, trusting God (and one another) each step of the way.

Our current challenges, while daunting, must not be backbreaking. It was December 2021 when St. Andrew's Session received formal letters of resignation from our Envelope Secretary and Treasurer of their intent to retire during 2022 following many years of faithful service. Early in 2022, our Session Clerk, also after many years of service, submitted a letter of resignation effective August. Since these notices were received, several potential candidates have been approached but none have felt called or qualified. Our Envelope Secretary and Treasurer have extended their retirement dates

The Treasurer, Session Clerk, and Envelope Secretary are the most critical volunteer positions in the Presbyterian Church. The Session Clerk is the constitutional officer of the Presbyterian Church and is the first contact in any congregation by the higher courts. Without persons to fill these vital positions, our basic functions grind to a halt. Imagine your home without working electricity, heat, or water. Imagine the mechanism for paying monthly expenses ceasing to function. How do we address these critical needs? We pray. We continue to stress the importance of finding persons to fill these necessary functions. We remember the words, "God who began a good work in you will (continue to – continuing action verb in Greek) perform it."

Our challenges **may not** be solved by someone under the roof of St. Andrew's. It is time to think beyond our own walls. It is time to move toward a collaborative understanding and practice of ministry with our Presbyterian colleagues.

Recently representatives from Knox, Trinity, Chinese, Knox Sooke and St. Andrew's Presbyterian congregations met to discuss what it might mean to form a more collaborative ministry. Collaborative ministry means: a partnership of shared resources, creative imagining, an opportunity to celebrate abundance! Some of those ideas were to form new elder groups from different congregations, share an administrator, a treasurer, office space, form a website with our sister churches, or create team clusters for mission projects.

The conversation was rich in enthusiasm and joy and the conversations will continue to discern where God is leading us. How will you be involved during this critical time in the life of St. Andrew's? Will you pray for God's wisdom and leadership?

Every fall, before all our lives changed with COVID, St. Andrew's would have been planning "The Bazaar". However, with changes as a result of COVID, and all the other changes that the last couple of years have brought to all of us, the plan now is to have an event that will be somewhat the same but will also have differences.

In past months, many at St. Andrew's have been working very hard to maintain community in various ways, but we all have missed having opportunities to work together as a church community. Now, as we move ahead with a Fall event we will have an opportunity to work together, and once again have fun together.

At present, plans are still being finalized, but for this year the key will be to keep things simple, to work within the spaces that we have and to offer an exciting new addition to the day.

Our fall event will take place on the afternoon of November 19th. Plans are for a luncheon/tea with entertainment by Ballet Victoria dancers. Reservations will be required for the tea tables so that we can plan appropriately.

There will also be homemade jams and jellies, books and possibly more for sale. Watch for updates.

There will be a planning meeting after worship, at coffee time, on October 2. There will be sign up sheets and we are hoping that folks will step forward to help in whatever way they can. There are many tasks to be accomplished so please join us as we finalize plans and get started.

### Worship – the transition continues!

Transitions abound! We welcome the choir back to worship, and they are joined by three choral scholars: Jorge, Akina, and Eva. They also help take choir practices – where they gain experience, and the men's and women's sections can practice separately when needed. Jamie Kim has also sung well-known gospel songs before services in the summer and in September, first in Korean and then English.

Ushers also remain hard at work, and with two less people than before the summer. They play an essential role in opening the church, welcoming people, and closing up after services. If you would like to join them, please let them know! — a few more ushers would make a difference to workloads. Similarly, volunteers are always welcomed by our audio/video team, who play an essential role in on-line and in-person worship. (On-line viewings remain typically greater than in-person attendance. A total of over 100 people participate in weekly worship at the moment, including those using paper transcripts of services.)

On Sept. 11th, Rev. Laura Kavanagh (Knox) led worship at St. Andrew's when ministers in three churches (St. Andrew's, Knox, & Trinity) "swapped pulpits". This marked the beginning of what is hoped to be greater active collaboration between these three congregations, plus Chinese Presbyterian and Knox Sooke.

Transitions in worship practices continue as the pandemic wanes (at least for now). The offertory is an important public declaration of our mutual thanksgiving to God for what we have been given – and as a token of gratitude we dedicate a portion of this to furthering the work of the church. To emphasize the intentional and participatory nature of the Offertory, session has agreed that an elder will greet people at the Narthex door, where givings can be left on a plate while entering. These will be brought to the front by two elders during the Doxology. (The white metal boxes in both entrances can continue to be used when entering or exiting.) This is experimental and may be modified as better ways of doing this evolve. The next step is that

session will consider in January whether offerings can be taken up from pews in a COVID-safe manner.

The major change by session is that masks will now be strongly recommended, but will not be mandatory as of Sunday, Oct. 9th. Recognizing that some people will prefer to sit with others that are masked, these will remain mandatory in the south sections of pews on the main floor, where red ribbons continue to help ensure physical distancing. As with the Offertory, increasing levels of infectivity may require changes back to previous protocols.

October 2<sup>nd</sup> is World Communion Sunday and there is no change in practices: both Broadman cups and inhouse cups and bread will be available at the door on the way in, and delivered to those at home. To recognize the international significance of this service, different breads from around the world will be used this year.

Worship services require many volunteers – and we thank all who give of their time so that we can worship together, either in the sanctuary or at home!


