Asset Mapping is an exciting process that allows us to refocus on our gifts and capacities and those of our neighbors, to connect those gifts to one another in creative combinations, and then to activate those connections to strengthen our congregation.

The Power of Asset Mapping: How Your Congregation Can Act on Its Gifts by Luther K. Snow

At our recent Session meeting Reverend Mitch introduced us to the process of "asset mapping". We practiced the process and discovered how it might be used at St. Andrew's.

In simple terms it means identifying assets and grouping them into different categories. Categories such as physical (church building), relationships (people we know), systems (streaming of church services), individuals (what do we know about people at St. Andrew's) and institutions (UVic). Please note these examples are meant as examples only and are not exclusive or limited.

Pictures may give you some sense as to the relationships of the ideas and how some might have been grouped.

Members of Sessions walked away from the exercise with a better appreciation of what we have to work with and what we have in order to further develop St. Andrew's as a downtown Church.

Comments from the elders attending included:

"Going through the church assets exercise refocused my understanding on what is our most valuable asset: the congregation and our community. How easy it is to become consumed by the importance of all the tasks and the physical assets which exist just to support our mission. We will have achieved our goal when we unite the two. "We sometimes start a project that in itself has merit, but which is not necessarily considered within our larger context. I was struck by the fact that the asset mapping process encouraged a natural assessment of our entire context. Connecting dots while building a path to a specific action meant consciously considering (and rejecting) the usefulness of other assets - and hence a more holistic approach to starting new initiatives.

"I found the exercise enlightening and energizing as we recognized the very important value of people resources. These gifts and talents have unlimited potential and possibilities.


"I liked that it fostered a sense of abundance... in contrast to one of scarcity that can accompany our thinking about the resources at St. Andrew's. The visuals of the exercise were tangible ...there are many resources of all types within our church family."



New Supplementary Hymn Booklet

Some time ago our music director, Christine Purvis, asked members to please send her lists of their favourite hymns that are not included in our hymnal. The response was very positive, and many were submitted – thank you! She then searched for and compiled hymns that are in the public domain (and hence no longer protected by copyright) and for which music scores were available. Thanks to her work, and with the assistance of Pastor Mitch, Whitney Hanna and Shannon Cummings, words-only supplementary booklets have now been compiled and printed, and will soon be in use.

Why a delay in their distribution and use? Pastor Mitch preaches from the lectionary, and hence Christine chooses music that suits each Sunday's readings. This is done well in advance, and she has already chosen hymns for much of January. Furthermore, it is inevitable that there will be Sundays for which there is no suitable material in the supplement – so a further slight delay is possible.

How will they be distributed? To keep costs down, 150 copies have been made; however, our Sanctuary holds over 500 people, and hence not every seat will have a supplementary booklet. To ensure that the booklets are left in pews that people habitually use, they will be given out at the door on the first Sunday of their use, and people will be asked to leave them in the book rack in front of them, along with the hymnal and Bible. After the service, booklets will be distributed in areas where people normally sit when numbers attending inperson worship have been high. (Some will also be retained for the inevitable situations when people sit in pews without a booklet.)

It is great to see this new supplement in print, and we look forward to its use in worship! Our thanks again to all of those who sent in their list of favourite hymns, and to those involved in the compilation and production of the booklet!

How Does that "Star Thing" Work?

On Epiphany Sunday, Pastor Mitch preached about the passage from the "wise men from the East" (Matt. 2) who, by a combination of following a star, interpretation of scripture, and "dreams" were led to Bethlehem – and then home again by a different route. I understand the general guidance a star can give, but the fine-detailed specifics of following a star until it "stopped over the place where the child was" always struck me as curious. It is one thing for a sailor to use the North Star for general direction, but quite another to navigate the Inside Passage in the dark! However, I was fortunate enough to meet a man who could fill in a few details, from personal experience.

As a student, I met Edward Howell in St. Andrew's, Scotland, where he and his wife befriended students especially Americans and Canadians. (He was not long retired, after a fascinating life and career.) Although his father was the minister of Paisley Abbey, and his older brother, a member of the Oxford Movement, he himself was a firm non-believer until what he referred to as his "Pauline conversion" in a PoW hospital in Greece. (An RAF squadron leader, he was seriously wounded during the invasion of Crete.) He described going to bed one evening as a man of no faith, and pondering his past, present and future. He made a decision to trust and follow God - and his life was never the same, following a powerful experience of God's grace that night. This started a life-long habit of spending an hour at the start of each day, waiting on God until he knew how he was to spend that day. Developing a "listening ear" led to a remarkable series of events. Although still injured, and against all advice, he felt God was calling him to escape.

Remarkably, he had a strong sense that he should follow a star for guidance. This repeatedly led him on safe routes, sometimes against his better rational judgment. Coupled with a strong sense of which doors to knock on, he connected with protective individuals and villages on his route through Greece to Turkey, and then back to the UK to recuperate.

Curious, I quizzed Mr. Howell about "how that star thing worked". He had no explanation, except that he was never in doubt: he felt so strongly moved by God to trust a specific star and follow it that he just did, even when it made no human sense. He relates in his autobiography how, on the night of his escape, the star led him through a village "for some considerable distance along well-frequented streets. My trail must have been crossed and re-crossed many times and would be quite impossible for dogs to trace. My natural inclination, to keep away from people and take to the hillside quickly, might well have been fatal" because, once out of the village, he could hear troops searching for him in the surrounding hills. Similar "star experiences" continued during his escape.

But the "star stories" didn't stop there. In what he described to me as a moment of foolish commitment, a partisan asked him to tell Winston Churchill when he got back to Britain that they would be fighting for Churchill until the British liberated Greece – and he promised that he would. Once back in St. Andrew's, he ignored the commitment until he finally sent a letter to 10 Downing Street, simply to clear his conscience. He was soon as surprised as his commanding officer by a summons to private lunch with the prime minister! He related to me that the visit began with a cup of tea with Lady Churchill, during which she graciously gathered facts about who he was, in preparation for an introduction at the start of lunch. Churchill arrived late in his traditional one-piece suit, obviously distracted, and not at all interested in his guest. His wife gave a précis of Mr. Howell's story, which Churchill ignored except for an occasional grunt – until the star was mentioned. That triggered an immediate and animated

exchange of experiences, as Churchill himself felt led by a star when escaping from a Boer PoW camp in 1899. They went on to talk about God's intervention in their lives and world events, and Churchill's firm belief that two miracles saved Britain when it should have been defeated: Dunkirk and the Battle of Britain. They parted, with Churchill animated and energized. Mr. Howell said that, in retrospect, the conversation took place during a dark and crucial time during the war. He never met Churchill again, but always wanted to know if the shared "star experience" was a gift from God to lift the prime minister's spirits.

But the interconnectedness of people's lives continued. A couple of years later in Edinburgh, Colina and I met the father of a friend, an RAF fighter pilot who also escaped from a PoW camp, this time in Italy. Our friend's father served in Egypt, and I mentioned Mr. Howell. It turned out that he was preparing to fly to Crete to report to Mr. Howell when news came in of the British defeat, so the mission was cancelled and they never met. (A quick telephone call led to a meeting of the two veterans for a memorable afternoon in St. Andrew's: 40 years late, but better late than never!) What have I learned about stars? If wise men need to know the house where Jesus lies, or Mr. Howell needs to know which village streets to escape along, I have no doubt but that the Holy Spirit can provide the required means of navigation! These "star stories" remind me that God truly is the same yesterday, today, and forever. The miracle of the Epiphany star is not diminished by the shared modern experience of others. The key takeaway for me is how we discern guidance and the nudging of the Spirit - rarely dramatic stars, and more often a quiet internal voice arising during quiet contemplation and prayer, or through a word from a friend or something we read or observe, or the alignment of events in our lives. An missionary was once asked about the "secret of his success", and he replied that he waited until he could see what God was

doing, and then he joined in. We are in a time of discernment at St. Andrew's. I don't expect a star to guide us – but I wonder what we see God doing around us, and how and when we might best join in?
