The Invitation to Holy Communion
A spiritual communion is a personal devotional that anyone can pray at any time to express their desire to receive Holy Communion at that moment, but in which circumstances impede them from actually receiving Holy Communion.

My Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Blessed Sacrament of the Altar. I desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving as I proclaim your resurrection. I love you above all things, and long for you in my soul. Since I cannot receive you in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, come spiritually into my heart. Cleanse and strengthen me with your grace, Lord Jesus, and let me never be separated from you. May I live in you, and you in me, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.

Did you notice the part of the prayer, "Since I cannot receive you in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, come spiritually into my heart." We cannot be together now to receive Holy Communion. During these tense and tenuous days, what an opportune time to pray this prayer of community and communion, with God and with one another. Thank you, St. Andrews for your faithfulness and kindness. Amen.
