Our "new normal" will include the wearing of masks or face shields, a shorter service,


allocated seating and no choral or congregational singing. These are all ways to help create a safe worship space for everyone who attends.

Parable from the Pastor

I saw a weather cartoon yesterday that resonated with many of us. Weather radar showed an ariel view of a large section of North America with storms in every section. The cartoon by-line said, "If you are not in the path of a hurricane, one will be assigned to you shortly." Too much has been assigned to us of late! Deadly fires continue to burn. The Pandemic persists. "How long, O Lord?" "From where will our help come? Our help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." The earth has been telling us for quite some time, "I am beyond stressed. Help. Stop destroying me. I can't breathe! I cannot see." And finally, the earth has stopped trying to make subtle hints. Finally, the earth said, "Enough is enough! You will stop!" Stop we have. While we have been stopped, have we listened to what the earth – what God has been trying to say to us? Have we understood what God needs us to understand about our lives and our world? We are itching to return to "normal". We are tired of distancing that keeps us from seeing those we love and cherish. We miss handshakes and hugs. We miss sharing a meal and the relaxed laughter of family and friends. We miss church. Today's <u>hymn to sing</u>
<u>to is "Christ, of all my hopes the ground"</u>

This hymn was written by a Presbyterian- The Rev. Ralph Wardlaw (b. 1779) who was accepted as a student of Theology at Glasgow University at age 12.

Rev. Wardlaw would publish books and hymnals during his ministerial career. He was a professor of theology and a cofounder of the Glasgow Theological Academy. Rev. Wardlaw was a prominent member of the anti-slavery movement in Scotland.

The hymn tune was written by César Malan (not to be confused with the Cesar Millan of dog training fame!) in 1827.
