Pastor's Parable

Doubt. Brian McLaren's book <u>Faith After Doubt: Why Your Beliefs Stopped Working and What to Do About It</u>, addresses the doubt that millions of people experience when their faith is shifting. McLaren offers "You and I don't have to keep our doubts a secret any longer." Good news for the one that legend has called Doubting Thomas. Truth be told, I believe that Thomas displayed more faith after Easter than all the other disciples combined. Thomas can serve as an excellent example for us as we consider our own doubts. Where is God in the midst of life's changes and challenges? Why do our prayers never seem to rise above the kitchen ceiling?

In the Sunday meditation for the 2nd Sunday of Easter, let's allow Thomas (and Brian McLaren) to guide us to see that our doubts are not the antithesis to our faith but, rather, a key ingredient in helping strengthen our faith. McLaren says, "Doubt need not be the death of faith. It can be, instead, the birth of a new kind of faith, a faith beyond beliefs, a faith that expresses itself in love, a deepening and expanding faith that can save your life and the world."

Thomas' expression when he recognize the risen Lord (or when the risen Lord recognized him, "My Lord and My God!" In other words, thank you for working in my doubt for because of it, I can now see You clearly." May it be so for us in these days of Easter. See you Sunday (in a manner of speaking \bigcirc)
