A recent book club group discovered Braiding Sweetgrass, a fascinating work by Robin Wall Kimmerer, a mother, scientist, professor and member of the Potawatomi Nation. I love this book as it has challenged me to the core!!

I was able to be a part of a virtual conversation recently with Dr. Kimmerer who was interviewed by profs from U Vic and UBC. She asks, "Can we behave as if the living world is a gift?" In today's culture everything is viewed through a market economy with all the world a commodity to be sold and purchased. When this happens, we grow increasingly poor, economically, politically, emotionally, socially and spiritually. What if we viewed the world through a gift economy with the world around us merits a "Thank you!" How dare we live an ungrateful life in which we fail to offer our thanks – in words, actions and attitude?

We are challenged to create longing within us to live in a world that is considered gift! Consider the lives that have been given for our comfort and our existence. Consider the tree that gave its life for the tissue paper, the massive oaks for our floors, the grapes that flavour our wine, the algae in our toothpaste. What if we begin to pay attention and notice until we feel awash in the gift of life around us? Everything we put into our mouths and everything that allows us to live is because of the gift of another life.

We are showered everyday with these gifts, but they are not meant for us to keep! Their life is in their movement. Our work and our joy is to pass along the gift and to trust that what we put into the universe will always come back.

Reflecting on our lives of late, it may be difficult to feel and to express a great deal of gratitude. Can you imagine thinking, feeling or saying, "Thank you that so much of our lives have been erased from our recent memories. No visits, hugs, or beautiful symphonies. Gone have been the memorable birthdays and anniversaries. Missing are the significant holidays.

What if instead of languishing in our losses, we celebrated our gifts. Thank you to the countless persons who have showed up at work every day over the last 13 months in Dr's offices and hospitals. Continue showing gratitude to the cashiers, delivery drivers, sanitation workers and postal employees. A gift economy creates new awareness of the sacrifices that have been and are being made so that we may live. Thank you for the new life that is emerging around us showing blooms and colors that remind us the death of fall and winter is now making possible the rebirth of the new life that is spring.

What if we begin to pay attention and notice until we feel awash in the gift of life around us?
