Together they made up a small part of the congregation that I served over 35 years ago in the Southeastern United States. They formed a myriad of personalities, backgrounds, likes and dislikes but were brought together by a common thread – to love and to serve Jesus Christ to the best of their ability.

The aforementioned group, combined with Nora, a retired city employee who filled the staff's candy dishes with his/her favourite, sweet treats on a weekly basis while having at her ready a litany of complaints based on her assessment of the worship service of the previous week. And Frank the faithful Sunday School Superintendent known for prompting his tardy Sunday School class by roaming the hallways with gentle cooing, "Here Chick, Chick." Then there was Betty, the conscientious Treasurer who kept a close eye on the budget, Myra who assured that the church kitchen was stocked to perfection and Gene whose landscaping of the entryway was a beauty to behold. Board meetings could be long and arduous but generally the outcome was focused on what we needed to do for the community and bound by a common love.

On a prominent wall outside the church office was a quilt containing squares that had been created 30 years prior during a summer youth project. Each square was sewn by a child that had grown up in the church. One square contained a hand drawn image of mom, dad, brother and sister entering the front door of the church. Underneath were the words, "Together we are God's family." Another showed an image of a child's baptism with the words, "Let the children come to me." Each square made up the quilt of those whose faith journeys began in that church long ago. Most of those who had been children growing up in that congregation now had families of their own and lived and worked far away. But their faith stories had been formed there, nurtured by the love of Walter, Bruce, Virginia, Margaret, Nora, Betty, Myra and Gene.

The faith stories of St. Andrew's continue to be told in new ways on Sunday, July 11! Sunday marks a passage when St. Andrew's may again worship in-person in our beautiful sanctuary. The hymns, children's sermons, baptisms, and weddings that have occurred in this this place over the last 132 years have formed our identity and given us a heritage. Sunday is a renewal as we gather in person to worship. While it is important to note that our work and our worship outside the sanctuary these 16 months have been just as life-giving and affirming, we are led to reclaim the truth that indeed, the church is not the building. The church is the people and Sunday, at 10:30 the people of St. Andrews will gather. Again. Thanks be to God!!!

A Little Good News Story About Some Big Animals

Two 12-year-old beluga whales that spent years in captivity entertaining humans at an aquarium in Shanghai, China, have found freedom at an open water sanctuary in Iceland.

The four-metre-long whales, which each weigh about 900kg, were flown 6,000 miles for over 30 hours in a 747 aircraft fitted with purpose-built containers from Changfeng Ocean World to a sanctuary in a bay on Iceland's Heimaey Island.

The whales, both females and previously known as Little Grey and Little White, now enjoy open water for the first time since they left a Russian whale research centre in 2011. (From Reader's Digest)


