Parable of the Pastor

Sunday was the First Sunday of Lent which began last week. Lent is made up of 40 days that lead through the agony of Holy Week before we arrive on Easter morning to celebrate the resurrection.

Lent is to be a time of sacrifice, prayer and examination. Today during the writing of my Morning Pages, I reflected on the process of examination. More than 400 years ago St. Ignatius Loyola encouraged prayer-filled mindfulness by proposing a process called the Daily Examen. It looks to a God who is near, present in the world, and active in daily life.

I was led to pray the Examen. The Examen looks for signs of the God's presence in the events of the day — lunch with a friend, a walk in the park, etc. The Examen recognizes that your feelings are full of spiritual meaning. Nothing is trivial! I wanted to offer each of us the simple formula.

- *Become aware of God's presence. I looked back on the events of yesterday. (1 Zoom call, one walk to the library, one committee meeting, etc.) It is important to ask God to bring clarity and understanding.
- *Review the day with gratitude. Gratitude is the foundation of our relationship with God. Note the joys and delights of the day. I remembered the work completed, and the people I interacted with. What did I receive and what did I give? Pay attention to small things—the food eaten, the sights seen, and other seemingly small pleasures. God is in the details. Pay attention to emotions. One of St. Ignatius's great insights was that we detect the presence of the Divine in the movements of our emotions.
- * Reflect on the feelings experienced during the day. Boredom? Anger? Resentment? Compassion? Confidence? What is God saying through these feelings? I remembered some ways that I fell short. The feeling of frustration perhaps means that God wants me to consider new possibilities in my life!
- * Choose one feature of the day and pray from it. Ask God to direct you to something during the day that is particularly important. It may involve a feeling—positive or negative. It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace. Or it may be something that seems rather insignificant. Look at it. Pray about it.
- *Look toward tomorrow. Ask God to give you light for tomorrow's challenges. Pay attention to the feelings that surface as you survey what's coming up. Are you doubtful? Cheerful? Apprehensive? Full of delighted anticipation? Allow these feelings to turn into prayer. Seek guidance from God and ask for help and understanding. Pray for hope.

I know that I did in my own examination. I hope it will do the same in yours.
