## Holy Week Blessing from the Pastor

Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. —Philippians 2:4–8

Walter Brueggemann writes in A Way other than Our Own, "As we walk the walk from Palm Sunday to Easter through the Thursday arrest and the Friday execution and the long Saturday wait in the void, imagine all of us, in the wake of Jesus, changing our minds, renewing our minds, altering our opinions concerning self and neighbor and world."

When was the last time you changed your mind? The clue to Jesus' call to "have the mind of Christ" is found in the way Jesus emptied and humbled himself of the need to defend or to explain himself. Can you imagine changing our minds and altering our opinions about ourselves and the world in ways that allow us to lower our expectations that often tie us in knots when those expectations are not met?

Having the mind of Christ will empty us of our need to control and our anxious passion to be 'in the know'. Easter freedom happens when we are released from the burdens we carry. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus" and "Jesus emptied himself" provides a significant formula for changing our minds. As Brueggemann prayed, so may we...

We are eager for Easter joy and new life, and yet we are haunted by the space between where we are and where you are. Grant us a new mind, a new readiness, a new heart, that we might stand with you in self-emptying obedience. Amen.


## God Walk Book Club
