Parable of the Pastor

Father Thomas Merton said in his book Contemplative Prayer, "Sometimes prayer is like a descent into our own nothingness, a recognition of helplessness, frustration, infidelity, confusion and ignorance. Note how common this theme is in the Psalms."

Father Thomas was remembering, "The Lord heard my cry and drew me up from a desolate pit..." "Do not be far away from me for trouble is near and there is no one to help." "Lord, my heart is not lifted up, my eyes are not raised too high; I do not occupy myself with things too great and too marvelous for me."

Within the last several days, I have visited with and been in conversation with several within our church family whose lives may be characterized by helplessness, frustration, and confusion. The loss of a spouse, frequent hospitalizations, crippling pain, and challenging, life-altering decisions that must be made have all framed these recent conversations. All allude to sleepless nights and the agony of asking "How long, O Lord?"

Each conversation, without exception, has offered in detail an underlying trust that God is mysteriously present. Their prayers for comfort, healing, and companionship even in the face of crippling loss have been answered. God has surprised when it has seemed that all hope was lost.

Every conversation has included an expression of gratitude for specific persons within St. Andrew's who have visited, brought greetings, news, and worship items to them. Each person has been reassured that they are not forgotten but valued even in their absence. Every one has been strengthen by our prayers. Some have shed tears over the pain and loneliness of his/her situation and yet all have expressed the deep knowing that God is near.

Visiting with and hearing story after story that contains the words "Thank you for not forgetting me. Thank you for praying for me. Thank you for visiting, for calling and for your continued care."

I leave each visit encouraged that I did so little, but God in God's power has done so much. The challenge for each of us is to pick up the phone and call the one that you may not have seen or talked with in awhile. Remind them you care. Listen to their story. Reassure them that you are praying for them... and then do just that. Their life will be strengthened and so will yours!

Father Thomas concludes, "Prayer does not blind us to the world, but it transforms our vision of the world, and makes us see it, and all mankind, in the light of God."

Music for Sunday, July 3rd

The organ prelude for Sunday is "A voluntary for the organ stop" by John Stanley. In music a voluntary is a piece of music, usually for an organ, that is played as part of a church service. In English-speaking countries, the music played before and after the service is often called a 'voluntary', whether or not it is so titled. John Stanley (1717-1786) was an English composer and organist. I am playing the first two sections of this piece.

The music for reflection is Air on a G string by Johann Sebastian Bach. This is an organ arrangement of the 2nd movement of Bach's Orchestral Suite #3 in D major.

Continuing Safe Worship

We continue to transition from a "rules-based" approach to "trust" that people will keep others safe from COVID by behaviours that reflect their love for those around them. (Alternate pews on the north side will continue to be marked, for those who wish more defined spacing between worshipers.)
