Parable of the Pastor

One day a traveler begged the Teacher for a word of wisdom that would guide the rest of the journey. The Teacher nodded affably and though it was the day of silence took a sheet of paper and wrote on it a single word, "Awareness." "Awareness?" the traveler said, perplexed. "That's far too brief Couldn't you expand on that a bit?" So the Teacher took the paper back and wrote: "Awareness, awareness, awareness." "But what do these words mean?" the traveler insisted. Finally, the Teacher reached for the paper and wrote, clearly and firmly, "Awareness, awareness, awareness means... Awareness!"

I am sensing the need to increase the silence in my life and as the Psalmist recommends, "Be still and know that I am God." Our silence reflects a treasured opportunity to hear God speak. The path to a deeper awareness of the presence of God is to talk less and listen more. Listen to God speaking in the falling leaves, the squirrels busily burying found treasures to eat later, and even in the quiet wind stirring the trees. Listen to God speak through the words of scripture and the time spent in silent prayer.

As Marjory Reitsma-Street, a member of the Vancouver Island Religious Society of Friends expressed in the Saturday edition of the Times Columnist, "How do people do silence, and why? Although religious practices vary, rituals and sounds are minimal in silent worship and meditation. One tries to still the body and listen, to let go of the business and busyness of everyday life—to become open to what is not self but other. In silence, there may come a softness to the heart, a willingness to feel the presence of others. Or hints from the unconscious, nudges from the ineffable mystery that help one to see a way forward through the tangle of life.

To hear the wisdom of Mother Teresa, In the Heart of the World: Thoughts, Stories and Prayers who wrote, "In the silence of the heart God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Then you will know that you are nothing. It is only when you realize your nothingness, your emptiness, that God can fill you with Himself. Souls of prayer are souls of great silence."

The postlude for this Sunday is Sigfrid Karg Elert's setting of "Now thank we all our God" by Sigfrid Karg-Elert. It is one of my favourite organ pieces and I play it almost every Thanksgiving.

Karg-Elert is a German composer of the early 20th century best known for his organ compositions. His setting of Now Thank we all our God uses the familiar hymn tune woven amongst big impressionistic chords. The piece is in ternary form so If you love the opening like I do, it comes back.

The choir anthem is "Look at the World" by the well known composer John Rutter. Born in England in 1945 John Rutter is best known for his choral music which is influenced by early 20th century English and French music as well as lighter music.
